Discover this exciting technique and enjoy a sense of well-being as your yarn glides easily on the new Knook from Pony! Produced in colour anodized aluminium, you'll experience the fun of Knooking in colour as well as the pleasure of working with this light weight and smooth Pony tool.

Available in a set of 4 and 6 mm.



Sewing in loose ends

We recommend the aluminium PONY wool needle for sewing up knitted pieces and tidying up loose ends. The flexible nylon loop is ideal, even for threading thicker yarns. Available in a set of 3 sizes.

Materials:

6 mm KNOOK
Pony wool needle
Firm, smooth cord or wool in a contrasting colour
(this needs to be twice the width of your work)
50 g Wool (approx. 55 - 70 m) colour A
50 g Wool (approx. 55 - 70 m) colour B

Finished size of iPad mini cover:

20 x 13.5 cm

Tension:


12 stitches and 19 rows to 10cms
(forward and return are counted as one row)

Knooking is crochet that looks like knitting and with a bit of practice you'll find knooking an easy technique, perfect for a small project and just the thing to slip into your bag for moments of creativity when out and about. The Knook is a crochet hook with an eye through which you thread a smooth cord. Ideal for crocheters who want to accomplish a knitted look and for knitters who fancy trying something new!


Tip:

The auxiliary cord or wool should be in a contrasting colour and slightly more rigid and a thicker gauge than the knooking yarn.


It's that simple: Knitting with the KNOOK




Thread the contrasting cord through the Knook. Make 18 chain stitches using colour A.



Inserting the hook into the loops that are now held on the cord, start the first row with **knit stitches**. With the working yarn behind your work, insert the hook into the loops from the front.



Row 3 + 5
Make knit stitches (see 4).



Work a row of 18 stitches to pick up your chain onto the knook. Do not cast off.



Guide the cord through the completed row of stitches, allowing it to hang loose at the beginning of the row. Turn your work.


Row 4 + 6 make purl stitches (see 6).

Row 7 make purl stitches in colour B.


Row 8 make knit stitches in colour B and continue with colour A.

Repeat rows 1 to 8 eleven times.

Cast off.



Pull the knook through your first row of stitches, guiding the cord through the loops. Turn your work.



Work the second row in **purl stitches**, with the working yarn in front of your work. Insert the hook into the loops from behind. Guide the cord through the completed row of stitches.

To complete:
Fold along the length, leaving 8 rows free at the top to fold over as a flap. Sew together using a Pony wool needle. Finish the flap with a decorative crochet edging in colour B, incorporating a length of chain stitches to form a loop fastening for the flap.
